DONATIONS ACCEPTED


Vice President Charles Fisher presented a check from American Legion Post 105 to the Madison County Genealogical Society.

BEACH FAMILY REUNION

Approximately sixty people from various middle Western States attended the fourth annual Beach family reunion held at Pastime park, Plain City, Ohio, August 16, 1931.

After a splendid picnic luncheon, Mr. Ernest Beach, of Plain City, Ohio, president of the association, called the meeting to order. Following this, short speeches were made by Mrs. Mary Beach Bidwell, and Mrs. Jesse E. Chance, London, Ohio; Mr. Howard G. Black, Mrs. William Walker, and Mrs. Elizabeth Converse, Plain City, Ohio; Dr. and Mrs. W. H. Welch, Miss Laurastine Welch, Lexington, Illinois, Mr. Keatts, Chicago, Illinois, Mrs. Donald Beach, Columbus, and Major Alfred H. Beach, Flint, Michigan.

Major Alfred H. Beach, genealogist, has done much research work in connection with the Beach families and is compiling a book from the information amassed after several years' investigation.

The officers of the past year were re-elected for the ensuing year, 1932. Mr. Ernest Beach, President; Mrs. Mary Beach Bidwell, vice-president; and Mrs. William Walker, secretary-treasurer.

The unveiling of a marker at the old cemetery, Plain City, Ohio, in memory of Obil Beach, soldier of the American Revolution, heightened the memorable occasion. The ceremony, a token of tribute and respect, was marked by the following incidents: The dedicatory address, presented by the Honorable Howard C. Black, great-great-grandson of the soldier; the pledge to the flag and the singing of "America", lead by the regent of the Plain City Chapter, D.A.R., and the Lord's Prayer.

Rebecca Jane Beach gracefully performed the unveiling of the marker; she is the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Downing Beach, London, Ohio, and the youngest descendant of the honored ancestor.

Within about two years after the conclusion of the War of 1812, fittingly named our Second War for Independence, Amos Beach and his family of seven boys and four girls made the wearisome journey from Goshen, Mass., to Darby township, Madison county, Ohio, in 1817. He was of Scottish descent and of revolutionary and heroic fiber. Obil Beach, his son, soldier of the American Revolution, born in Goshen, Mass., Dec. 25, 1758, died Sept. 1, 1846, at the age of 88 useful years--"has left us an enviable record, a source of pride and congratulation, and as blazing the way of us, his descendants, may we not suffer the torch he carried to become dim, nor by any act of ours, cast a shadow upon the memory of him, who has left us so glorious an inheritance."

Amos' six other sons also fought in the War of 1776. It is interesting to add that the lives of Obil Beach and Mrs. Lucy Beach, respected citizen of London, Ohio, more than span the life of our nation.

Gradually the people departed leaving with a feeling of warmth towards those whom they had met, hoping that next year they might be privileged to gather again with their relatives.

13. Mrs. Al. Littler, Allerton farm, fatally burned.
22. Cope & Martin's millinery store, London, damaged by fire.
19. Reunion of 26th, 113th and 95th O.V.I., London.
30. Granery of Mack Slaughter, Midway, burned.
Mr. and Mrs. John H. Stone, London, celebrate their golden wedding.

5. Kirwin & Ballenger's furniture factory, Plain City, destroyed by fire.
1. Cornerstone of St. Joseph's Catholic Church laid at Plain City.
Simon Neff struck and killed by locomotive in London.
13. Bruce Kilgore's house, Lafayette, destroyed.
16. Ivan Randolph, West Jefferson soldier boy, died en route from Philippines.
Mr. & Mrs. N. J. D. Kauffelt, Mt. Sterling, celebrate their golden wedding.

NOVEMBER

6. Republicans hold election.
20. John J. Horen, London boy, heard from; suffering from a gunshot wound received in Philippines.

ROBERTS

Charles Cary, the fifth child of a family of nine children born to Charles and Harriet McCan Roberts, was born in Union township, Madison county, Ohio, April 21, 1841, and died at his home, south of West Jefferson, April 2, 1908, aged 66 years, 11 months and 11 days.

He passed the earlier years of his life about three miles west of London in Union township. He was engaged in farming and kindred occupation until Aug. 21, 1862, when he enlisted in Co. A., 40th Regiment, O. V. I., under Captain William Jones and Col. John Cranor. The regiment took part in numerous engagements. He received a slight gunshot wound in the battle of Chicamauga, Sept. 18, 1863, and remained in the hospital four days, received a gunshot wound at Kessaw Mountain, June 20, 1864, and was in the hospital at Chattanooga about two months, at Nashville six months and honorably discharged at Columbus, O., March 16, 1865.

His paternal grandfather was a distinguished scout and soldier in the war of 1812. His maternal grandfather, General John G. McCan, was quartermaster general of the U.S. army of Ohio in the war of 1812-14. Our subject was united in marriage to Virginia A Douglas, of Franklin county, O., Oct. 17, 1872, and to this union were born six children: Olive Roberts Early, deceased; Charles William, of Columbus, O.; Oscar Douglas, at home; Ethel M., and Shirley Roberts, at home. He leaves to mourn his loss a devoted wife, two sons, three daughters, one grandson, two brothers, John M. Roberts, of London and B. F. Roberts of Jefferson township, and one sister, Mrs. Estella Wilson, of Clark county, besides a very large circle of friends. He was a public spirited citizen and served as trustee of Jefferson township for several terms. He has served as Post Commander of Wilson Burrows Post No. 398 of which he was a faithful member. He was also a member of the I.O.O.F. Lodge, No. 412, for many years and when in health he attended the meetings and took part. He was converted and became a member of the M.E. church at Georgesville, O., in 1892 and has lived a faithful christian life ever since. And while he was a brave and faithful soldier of the war of '61-'65 he also in 1892 engaged in another war and with Jesus as his captain and colonel he has won a greater battle than the other, for there is no discharge in that war and as he peacefully sleeps the sleep of the righteous, we can say of Brother Roberts as Paul said "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith henceforth that is laid up for our brother a crown of righteousness." The wife has lost a devoted companion, the children a indulgent father, one who always delighted to make his loved ones happy but to the weeping wife and children will say follow in his footsteps and let his God be your God and live such consistent christian lives that when time with you is no more and you have crossed over the river of death you will then be greeted by husband and father, never more to part but to live with our Master. Thus another upright citizen and a christian worker in the Master vineyard has gone home to glory and his work here below is done.
